Varied experiences belong to our story. We tell them to each other and pass them on so that we do not forget them, so that they will also not be forgotten in the future. We all live from the \*recall!\*, \*remember!\* of earlier generations. In the short term or in the long run, historical forgetfulness becomes dangerous.

In the Wellspring Days of this year, we are dealing with the need for deep breathe when life requires the adventurous from us in its fullest spectrum. Our story is always embedded in and part of the greater story of God with his people. If we do not cherish and honour them, but instead lock them away, eliminate them or pass over them with what »people« consider to be important, an entire cosmos us under threat of being lost.
